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The first casualty of war is the truth. This axiom is especially true these days with the US Presidential Campaign of 2016. Registration:

Yes, that is it. All of nine (9) protesters! The doors opened at 4:00 PM with the main event starting at 7 PM. If I could attend the rally, so could the Trump protesters. Needless to say, I was a little disappointed in the anti-Trump turnout.

So what did the signs say?

Don't Trump (the) USA The Hate is just visiting. Florida loves. Trump-Putin 2016 Trump's Wall of Shame – Photos of the various Republicans Tiny Hands (couldn't see the rest) Trump cardboard cutout saying "I'm dangerous for America" No place in the White House for a Sexist Dump Trump



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Security was handled by the TSA with oversight from the Secret Service. For those who do not know, the TSA handles Airport Security and typically lines are long. They did not disappoint. We waited for about 45 minutes before our screening, which went fairly quickly once we got to the front of the line.





Free Speech

When we finally got in and found a couple of seats, it was time to actually listen to the warm up speakers. Here are the highlights of the opening acts:

Diamond and Silk: I have no idea who they are before this event, being as I do not view video blogs. Their best line: Trump knows how to sign the front of a check as well the back.

Pam Bondi: Florida Attorney General. Took over the Obamacare case as Florida was one of first states to sue the US Government over the Affordable Care Act. Best line: I'm tired of suing this President.

The Speech

The audio at the event was horrible. If you hear the audio from YouTube, you'll understand.

Social Media Ads

In between music and the Public Service Announcement, a series of short campaign ads aired. I found out later that these were released on social media platforms. They were new to me, but not new to most in attendance. The exception to this one was the Pac-Man ad, which was released the previous week, which many in the audience had not seen and got some reaction.

Protesters Part Deux

One of the more amusing things was the Public Service Announcement which was played between speakers telling us how to deal with hecklers and protesters. We were told to be very nice and not directly engage them. Please point them out to security and drown out their heckling with cries of "Trump! Trump! Trump!"

Considering the amount of security present and how far the podium is from general public, I have to wonder about the mental abilities of the four (4) separate individuals who decided to try to interrupt the proceedings. You register for the event using a mobile phone, you travel to the facility, only to get maybe ten (10) seconds of interruption in before you are physically removed by security and get the pleasure of spending a night in jail.
